



Get to know them: Hornbills of our Parks and Gardens

In the mid-1800s, the Oriental Pied Hornbill was believed to be extinct in Singapore, possibly due to hunting and the loss of their homes. But thanks to the Singapore Hornbill Project, there are now about 100 of them living here. This project involves putting up artificial nest boxes for the birds to build their nests and lay eggs in.
